

## Dear Larry,

Greetings and thank you for your compassionate and heartfelt e-mail and leadership about this virus and our response to it. Caring so deeply for our residents as we do it is always troubling when something that can be so threatening to their health becomes so prevalent. The fact that there isn't much they can do to cure it also adds to those concerns.

When reflecting on this health crisis I rest in the truth of and pray the words of Psalm 46: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore, will not we fear, though the earth be removed, and though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea; Though the waters thereof roar and be troubled, though the mountains shake with the swelling thereof. There is a river, the streams whereof shall make glad the city of God, the holy place of the tabernacles of the most High. God is in the midst of her; she shall not be moved: God shall help her, and that right early. The heathen raged, the kingdoms were moved: he uttered his voice, the earth melted. The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge."

I again want to thank you for ensuring that we are not only being proactive in our approach to the virus, but also that we are looking after the spiritual health of our residents, families and associates. It is such a gift to work for an organization that understands and appreciates the importance of our spiritual and emotional well-being.
